



Do you recognise any of these war memorials? Where have you seen them before?













NOTE: The website has lots of information so try to use the links on the information slides provided to help with navigating.




Find a soldier from Luton

Members of the Luton Town football club have come forward splendidly to join the Footballers' Battalion. There was a big meeting of professional players at the Fulham Town Hall on Tuesday atternoon to hear particulars with regard to the battalion, and the Luton players were represented by H. P. Roberts and F. Lindley. At the close of the meeting these two wing forwards were amongst the first five to step up and enlist. They were given a great reception. Soon there was a regular procession of "pros": so many in fact that recruiting officers from different depots had to be hastily summoned to cope with them or the delay would have been considerable. Altogether 35 were enrolled at the meeting and they afterwards marched to Chelsea Barracks. They were then given 10 days' leave. Their pay is 2s. 9d. a day while at home, and the men living out of "town" were paid in advance.

Yesterday morning Roberts and Lindley informed the other Luton players who turned up at the dressing rooms for training. of what had occurred. Some of them had already made up their minds to enlist, but others then joined in the movement, with the result that six more of Lutan's professionals went up by train just after one o'clock yesterday and were enlisted. The new soldiers in addition to the two forwards already mentioned. are J. Dunn (back), R. W. Frith and T. T. Wilson (half backs), A. Wile.nan, A. Roe, and E. Simms (forwards). They were accompanied to London by Joe Johnson and Trainer W. Lawson. "Billy" himself would very much like to have joined. He already has two sons in the Territorials. Of the players enlisted, Roberts, Frith and Wilson are married. The Footballers' Battalion is the 17th Middlesex--the famous "Die-Hards" regiment. The players will report themselves when called up and will go into training at Richmond. They will be allowed leave to take part in all their Club's Saturday League and Cuo matches until the end of the season and as well as drawing their Army pay they will receive their wages from their football club.

Photos of the Luton players who have enlisted together with further particulars in connection with their enlistment will appear in the "Saturday Telegraph."



Timeline – Luton during the War







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mighty gathering, a wonderful concourse of people, assembled at Luton Hoo Park on Sunday afternoon to participate in a ited memorial service to men who have paid the supreme sacrifice for their God and country.

Nothing could have brought home more forcibly the sympathy, interest and personal feelings of gratitude the people of the town have for those who so nobly bore the brunt of battle than the crowd which filled the capacious slopes of the Park to pay its intuit of affection and remembrance to those who fell in the fight.

Probably 20,000 people were there, and no previous event for years past has seen such a magnificent attendance.

People began to arrive as early as 2pm, and half an hour later the streets from the Corn Exchange to the Park were thronged with crowds making their way towards the service. Brakes and cars were provided for men who through wounds were unable to walk, and they were given seats close to the Drum-head.

[Beds & Herts Saturday Telegraph: August 2nd, 1919]

The Borough Justices continued on Thursday morning [July 31st, 1919] their heavy task in dealing with the long list of prisoners who appeared before them on charges arising from the Peace riots in Luton. Another long day's sitting resulted in a considerable addition to those who will be called upon to take their trial before Judge and jury at the next Beds Assizes in Dctober.

General evidence was given by Chief Officer Akxander Andrew, (pictured right) of the Luton Fire Brigade. He said he received the call to the fire at the Town Hall at 10.30pm. At that time only five other men were at the station.


The Brigade had been out twice previously that hight to fires in Balley Street and Salisbury Road. He at first thought, for the safety of the firemen, it would be better to use the internal appliances in the Town Hall. Second Officer Plummer and three other men were therefore sent to the Town Hall, and the hydrant at the rear of the Assembly Hall was used.

Later another message was received, and witness turned out with No 2 engine and two men. When he arrived a small fire was burning in the Food Office. The first aid apparatus would have ben sufficient to extinguish the fire, and they proceeded to use it.

They had the hose unstrapped and were about to connect up to the first aid pump when the mob rushed them, striking and injuring the two firemen – W.G. Burgess and J. Garrett – so that they were unable to on with their work. Witness was that alone, and was prevented Search the Site
