Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Anyone who prefers father or mother to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who prefers son or daughter to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me. Anyone who finds his life will lose it; anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me.

Jesus's instructions to the twelve apostles are very direct about how they are to go and spread the Good News of the kingdom of God to others. In the last verse we heard, he reminds them (and us) that whenever we interact with another person, it is as if we are interacting with Jesus himself. If each of us were to treat everyone as if they were Jesus, with respect and honour, our community and our world would be very different.

God our Father, you call each of us by name, and you treasure each of us individually as though no-one else exists. Inspire us to respect and value each person who comes into our lives this day. Amen.

Saint Thomas Tuesday 4 July
